The **mission** of the DWI/Drug Court Program is to promote community safety, and to assist participants in the recovery from substance abuse disorders, in order to break the cycle of addiction.

Program description

The DWI/Drug Court Program is a court-supervised, comprehensive treatment collaborative for nonviolent offenders. This is a voluntary program that includes regular court appearances before a designated DWI/Drug Court Judge, substance abuse treatment. alcohol/drug testing, regular attendance at selfhelp meetings, and regular probation meetings. DWI/Drug Court requires a minimum 12-month commitment.

Benefits include:

- Helping and preparing individuals to lead and alcohol and drug-free lifestyle.
- Probated fines
- Community service requirements waived
- Reduced ignition interlock fee
- Court may grant an Order for Occupational Driver's License.

The program is designed to promote self-sufficiency and personal responsibility.

Participation in this program is a privilege and requires personal commitment. Members of the DWI/Drug Court Team are present to provide guidance and assistance. However, the final responsibility is upon the individual and one must be motivated to make this change and commit to a more responsible way of life.

Referral and Screening Process

Upon being arrested and charged with an offense in Collin County, you may be considered for acceptance into a DWI/Drug Court Program. Every participant will complete a screening to determine if eligible for the Program. Applicants will need to complete a substance abuse evaluation, and an interview with a DWI/Drug Court Supervision Officer. During this time you will be fully advised of all the rules and procedures, program phases and court expectations. Entry is voluntary but will require participant to enter a plea, and be placed on Community Supervision.
